Yeah, but did you hear about Juan? Someone just told me-- he caught COVID, and he's really sick. Who knows when he'll be able to come back to work.


I hadn't heard. But I feel completely fine.

Why would you get a test? You don't look sick at all. You can't have COVID!


Actually, Jorge's right. Even if you look and feel fine, you could still have the virus.

I hope so, too. In the meantime, I'm thinking about getting tested. I want to keep you and abuela safe.





Are you feeling okay? Do you need me to make you some tea?

If I get tested, I'll know for sure if I have COVID or not.



Let's have dinner outside tonight. We can sit farther apart, and that way the virus doesn't hang around in the house.
